


INFORMATION FROM OUR UTILITIES

COMED - As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to impact ComEd customers, the utility company has a new comprehensive package of more flexible financial assistance programs and payment arrangements that could fit your needs. Assistance is available for:

- ⇒ Eligible, limited-income households who are past due on their ComEd bill.
- ⇒ Financial hardship due to job loss, illness, military deployment, disability, or a senior citizen.
- ⇒ Military personnel that are experiencing a hardship.
- ⇒ Some organizations and non-profits having difficulty paying their electric bills.

We are seeing an unfortunate increase in utility-related scam attempts during these challenging times. Criminals are attempting to impersonate the name of ComEd and other trusted organizations to trick consumers into providing personal information, or act on urgent requests for payment that are not legitimate, such as:

- ⇒ Cash or credit incentives to obtain personal information.
- ⇒ Claims that your service will be disconnected unless payment is made.
- ⇒ False employment offerings soliciting personal information.
- ⇒ Requests for cash or to purchase a prepaid card to make a payment.

ComEd will never call a customer to ask for their account number, ask for personal information like their Social Security number or bank information or ask to make a direct payment with a prepaid cash card. Never provide or confirm personal or financial information to anyone initiating contact with you while claiming to be a ComEd representative whether by phone, in-person, or email. **If you believe you have been a target of a scam, we urge you to contact the Summit Police Department at (708) 563-8112 and report suspicious activity.** For additional information or if you have concerns about the status of your account, please contact 1-800-EDISON-1 (1-800-334-7661).

NICOR GAS - has suspended service disconnections and is waiving late payment charges until July 26TH. COVID-19 ISN'T THE ONLY BUG IN TOWN...



People assume that if mosquitoes are not biting then precautionary measures are not necessary. Be sure to protect yourself against mosquitoes, especially when mosquito annoyance is low.

* **APPLY** mosquito repellent containing 20-35% DEET to clothing. Concentrations of 10% or less are for children aged 2-12. Some other EPA registered repellants are Picaridin and Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE). Always be sure to follow the label directions!

* **REPAIR** damaged window screens or other ways mosquitoes may enter the home. Inspect openings around window air conditioners, vents, etc.

During the summer months, the **Desplaines Valley Mosquito**

BULK GARBAGE PICKUP AUGUST 8TH

While we are all staying at home, why not pick-up some good new habits! The Village Water Department has extra recycling containers for plastic, paper, and glass on 59TH Street by the Municipal Garage. When using the recycling bins, there is no dumping of any materials other than the ones on the signs. Please put the materials in the bins or in **ber tires, paint, or chemicals in your trash cans!** If you would like to **call the Illinois EPA at 1-800-CleanUp (253-2687).** The Household Hazardous Waste Facility, 156 Fort Hill Drive Naperville, has also resumed its pre-COVID-19 operations, and is available to all Summit residents. Household hazardous waste items are materials purchased for cleaning or maintaining a home. Business waste is not accepted. All participants must remain in their vehicles and have the material easily accessible for off-loading by staff. The facility is open 7 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 9 a.m. - 2 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays, excluding holidays. For any questions, call (630) 420-6095.

SUMMIT VEHICLE STICKERS NEEDED BY JULY 31ST!!

Village ordinance requires any resident owning a vehicle in Summit to display a vehicle tag which needs to be renewed every year. It is also required to remove expired stickers from the windshield. Tags must be displayed on the lower right corner of your windshield by no later than **July 31ST, 2020.**

New residents must obtain their vehicle tags 30 days after they move in. New cars must show a vehicle tag 30 days after being purchased, and proof of purchase date is required. **Late Payment Penalty; On September 1ST, the original fee will double!**

EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR HOUSEHOLDS IN SUMMIT

COVID-19 has put additional stresses and financial burdens on households and families across Illinois. **The Pritzker Administration, in partnership with the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO), is leveraging federal CARES Act funds in the State's 2021 budget to expand assistance and eligibility to serve more families with emergency relief programs as part of the new Help Illinois Families initiative.**



MORE ASSISTANCE FOR MORE NEEDS

Help Illinois Families expands on the existing Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Community Services Block Program (CSBG). If you meet the income requirements and submit your application, you may be eligible for emergency assistance to cover the costs of utility bills, rent, temporary shelter, food, and other household necessities.

LIHEAP helps eligible low-income households pay for home energy services. This includes assistance with heating, gas, propane and electricity. CSBG offers Illinoisans an opportunity to receive support for an array of essential services including rent assistance, food, temporary shelter, medicine, and more.

ASSISTANCE TO MORE SUMMIT INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES

New eligibility thresholds make Help Illinois Families available to more individuals and families, in response to the bigger challenges

many are facing due to COVID 19. **But the program will still be available to all current qualifying low-income households, regardless of how COVID-19 has affected them.**

AN EASY ONLINE PRE-APPLICATION PROCESS

A new online pre-application form makes the process faster and easy. It lets you determine your eligibility and start the application process remotely. All applications will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis.

APPLICATION DATES AND DEADLINES

Expanded LIHEAP assistance and eligibility applies to applications for the 2021 financial year. These open on July 27TH, 2020. CSBG applications are available year-round. The expanded assistance and eligibility already applies to all CSBG applications.

AM I ELIGIBLE?

If you need help with basic household amenities covered by the programs mentioned above and believe that you may be income-eligible, please review the following before submitting an application:

Is my household income within 200% of federal poverty level? If your household's combined income for the 30 days prior to application (gross income for all household members, before taxes are deducted) is at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, you may be eligible to receive assistance.

Add \$747 monthly income per person above 4 people.

What documentation do I need to prove eligibility? For each household member, please have the following documents ready to confirm eligibility with your LAA or CAA: social security card; proof of income over last 30 days through paystub, check or copy of check showing fixed income amount (e.g. SSA, VA, DHS benefits) or other proof of documentation for any income source; and utility bill if seeking utility bill assistance or lease if seeking rental assistance.

START YOUR APPLICATION!!!

If you believe you are eligible and do NOT need assistance from a live agent, it's time to start your pre-application form online. Start by visiting helpillinoisfamilies.com. If you need assistance with completing and submitting your application, **contact the call center at (833) 711-0374 for live support. The call center will provide translation services in English, Spanish, and other languages if necessary and TDD services for callers with hearing impediments. You can also contact the Arab American Family Services, 9044 S. Octavia Ave., Bridgeview, (708) 599-2237.**

Check Pre-Application Status

After your pre-application form has been submitted, you will be contacted to confirm eligibility and determine the amount of your benefit. Please keep in mind the volume of requests is very large given the impact of COVID-19 and it may take longer to be processed.

PHASE 4, RESTORE ILLINOIS

Five-Phase, Regional Plan for Saving Lives, Livelihoods, and Safely Reopening Illinois

Building on data, science, and guidance from public health experts and after consulting with stakeholders across the state, Governor JB Pritzker announced Restore Illinois, a five-phase plan focused on saving lives, livelihood, and safely reopening Illinois.

As you may already know, **Phase 4 allows all our restaurants and bars to be open.** Businesses will be allowed to operate at their normal licensed hours. We also allow those that would like to continue with outdoor spaces to continue, but only from the hours of 11am to 11pm. **Video Gaming has also been allowed to resume. Public meetings and social events may resume, but are limited to 50 guests or 50% of overall room capacity.** Seated area capacity of restaurants and bars should be determined by arranging seating to provide a minimum of 6 feet between tables or other designated patron service areas. Indoor dining can reopen with groups of 10 or less, with tables spaced 6 feet apart in seated areas and with standing areas at no more than 25% of capacity.

Someone You Should Know Dennis Nuccio

'Someone You Should Know' is where we highlight residents of our community **who have made significant contributions and unparalleled service to the Village of Summit over the years** assisting it to flourish; and / or individuals who have gone on to become famous in their own right and have once called the Village of Summit their home.

Dennis Nuccio is a pianist and piano teacher. He has been teaching the adults and children of the Village of Summit and nearby communities for the past **59 years**. You read that right...59 years!

Dennis was born in Chicago and raised in Argo at 6064 South 75TH Court, residing there for 22 years. His grandfather, Dominic Nuccio, bought the house in the 1920s as one of the company houses from Corn Products. **It is said that he went to Springfield with other pioneers of Summit-Argo** to convince the then Governor of the State of Illinois to have Archer Road paved. They were successful.

Dennis's father, Blair Anthony Nuccio, was also a piano teacher and taught all of their kids to play the piano. Therefore, Dennis is not the only pianist in the family. His brothers Blair and David, as well as sister Denise, are all accomplished pianists. Denise also plays violin and jazz piano professionally. His brother Dave plays bass guitar professionally and is a Professor of Music at Joliet Junior College.

Dennis's father taught for many years at his studio on South Kedzie Avenue in Chicago and at **6159 South Archer Road in Argo, above what is now the El Famous Restaurant**. Dennis taught there from 1961 until 1987, at which time he bought the **old Knights of Columbus Hall across from St. Blase Church, where he lived and taught for 19 years**. As an aside, Dennis's father graduated from St. Blasé School in 1925, his brother Blair in 1953, Denise in 1960 and himself in 1956. Dennis's youngest brother David graduated from Graves Elementary School in 1969. All were graduates of Argo Community High School. After graduating from Argo, Dennis would go on to attend classes at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago.

Some of Dennis's most notable students, and forgive us if we omit someone, are his brother **Dave, Cole DeGenova, Paula Di-Grazia, Lynne Hoyne, Aleco Julius Jr., Katie Kadan, Lee Kirksy Jr., Paula Kowalkowski, Linda Mack, Alicia Ponce, Augustin Portugal, Ania Dron Ray, Sharlene Rodriguez, and Greg Ward**. He also remembers enjoyable lessons with **Marvel Parker and Sergio Rodriguez**.

As well as instructing piano students, Dennis has performed professionally throughout the years. He was the **house pianist at the Velvet Room in Summit**, and at **Henrici's Restaurant in Oak Brook Mall**, both of which are now closed. He also was **staff pianist for the Chicago Dental Society**.

Dennis greatly enjoyed all aspects of his profession, especially his 59 years watching the development of his students, several of whom have gone on to careers of their own in music.



THE TAKE ON TAXES

The Second Installment Cook County property tax bills have been posted to www.cookcountytreasurer.com. A new Illinois law increases **to 13 months the time that taxpayers have to pay delinquent Cook County property taxes** giving more breathing room to homeowners and businesses struggling to pay their bills. **The Annual Tax Sale has been postponed** until after the Governor's pandemic disaster declaration is lifted. Owners can avoid the Tax Sale by paying all delinquent taxes and interest before the Sale begins. We encourage you to stay home. Homeowners who are newly qualified to receive any of the exemptions on the left, but did not receive it in 2020 will need to apply in 2021. You can also search \$75 million in available property tax refunds, search \$34 million in missing exemptions going back 4 years, access your 20 year tax history, and complete a name or address change. We encourage you to contact the office online for the fastest response. State and Federal Income taxes were due on **July 15TH**. **Taxpayers who have already filed a return can check the status of their return by using the "Where's My Refund?" link located at www.MyTax.Illinois.Gov.**
